How to Play

Divide students into small groups (4 groups per class or groups of 4-5 students works best). Have each group select a game piece and place it on HS Orientation. The object of the game is to go through freshman (first side of the board) year, sophomore year (second side of the board), etc. and be the first team to get to Graduation.

Students will select a College Terms card and answer the question. For every correct question, students should move forward (if the team gets the answer correct but it suggests they move backward, they may stay where they are) and for every incorrect answer they will move backward following the directions (if the team gets the answer wrong but it suggests they move forward, they must stay where they are).

If a team selects a Surprise!! card, they must ALL follow the directions on the card to complete the challenge and move forward. If they do not all complete the challenge they move backwards the designated spaces.

<p>Question 10: What is a grant?</p> <p>Financial assistance that does not require repayment</p>	<p>Question 11: What is the difference between a job and an internship?</p> <p>Job--Apply and are hired; done to earn money Internship--Used to increase student knowledge in a field of study; may be required by college; might include salary or college credit</p>	<p>Question 12: What is a loan? What is one good and one bad thing about getting one?</p> <p>Financial assistance that must be repaid; (answers will vary) you can afford to go to school but you have to pay the money back at some point</p>
<p>Question 13: What is the difference between a major and a minor?</p> <p>Major--Student's primary field of study Minor--Student's secondary field of study</p>	<p>Question 14: What does it mean if you need a prerequisite?</p> <p>A course that must be taken prior to taking another course</p>	<p>Question 15: What is special about a scholarship?</p> <p>Financial assistance based on specific criteria and merit; does not have to be repaid</p>
<p>Question 16: Define "rolling admission."</p> <p>Policy in which a school sends out acceptance letters to students as they are accepted (versus waiting to send out all letters at one time)</p>	<p>Question 17: What is a work-study program and what is it good for?</p> <p>A federal financial aid program that allows students to work a campus job and the salary goes to help pay for tuition costs</p>	<p>Question 18: What does AP stand for and why would students take the class(es)?</p> <p>Advanced Placement; to challenge themselves, for their diploma track, class interest/skill, and for possible college credit</p>

<p>Question 19: What are graduate classes?</p> <p>Courses offered beyond the Bachelor's degree level; Graduate students have received a Bachelor's degree and are enrolled in a post-baccalaureate program</p>	<p>Question 20: What is a transcript? What is it used for?</p> <p>The cumulative official record containing the courses, semester hours, and grades earned by a student; given to colleges and employers to demonstrate how hard the student has worked academically and to indicate the completion of a program</p>	<p>Question 21: What is the difference between resident and non-resident status? What does it affect?</p> <p>Student status based on place of legal residence; non-residents (out-of-state) often have to pay higher fees and meet higher admission requirements than residents</p>
<p>Question 22: What is an undergraduate?</p> <p>An enrolled student who has not completed a baccalaureate degree (a freshman, sophomore, junior or senior)</p>	<p>Question 23: What does it mean to be wait-listed?</p> <p>You have not yet been admitted to the school but are on a waiting list in case an opening becomes available; students are ranked in order of priority</p>	<p>Question 24: What is a branch campus?</p> <p>A campus connected to, or part of, a larger institution; IUS is a branch campus of IU</p>
<p>Question 25: What subjects does the ACT test?</p> <p>English, math and science</p>	<p>Question 26: What is a perfect score on the SAT?</p> <p>2400 with the writing section 1600 English and math only</p>	<p>Question 27: What is your course load? What is typical?</p> <p>The number of credit hours a student takes each semester; the average full-time student takes 16</p>
<p>Question 28: What is a Federal Stafford Loan and how is it different than a regular loan?</p> <p>The federal program that provides low-interest loans for college students; benefits are lower interest rate, fixed interest rate, and 6-month grace period for repayment after student stops attending school full-time</p>	<p>Question 29: What is Greek life referring to?</p> <p>Social fraternities and sororities</p>	<p>Question 30: What does FAFSA stand for? What is it good for?</p> <p>Free Application for Federal Student Aid; lets you and the college know how much and what type of financial aid you qualify</p>
<p>Question 31: The PLAN test is a preparation test for what other test?</p> <p>ACT</p>	<p>Question 32: What is a virtual visit?</p> <p>The use of the internet to investigate various colleges by looking at the college's homepage; students can "tour" the campus, ask questions, and find out more about the college without having to visit (although actual visits are best for colleges you are really interested in)</p>	<p>Question 33: Why would a student submit an intent to enroll form?</p> <p>To hold their spot at the college; this is your commitment to going to that school</p>
<p>Question 34: Either define SAR report or tell what the letters stand for.</p> <p>It is the report from a student's FAFSA that lets the student and the college know what federal financial aid they qualify for; Student Aid Report</p>	<p>Question 35: What does it mean to test-out?</p> <p>To pass a test for a specific college class that allows to skip that class and move on to a higher level class earlier/instead (i.e. if you test out of college Spanish I you wouldn't have to take that class and would instead start with college Spanish II)</p>	<p>Question 36: Why would you want to go to an accredited college?</p> <p>Accreditation is an endorsement given to an educational institution and/or degree programs by an organization that reviews qualifications; accreditation shows that the school/program meets objective standards; you do not want to go to a college/program that is not accredited for fear your degree will mean nothing to employers</p>
